Thomson Terrace Allotments C.I.C. Health and Safety Policy-Site Risk Assessment

- All activities carry an element of risk and allotment gardening is no exception.
- All members are asked to take health and safety needs seriously at the same time as approaching the issue sensibly.
- Children must always be supervised by parents or another designated responsible adult.
- Members have a duty of care to themselves and each other to act responsibly and comply with all aspects of the Members Rules.
- New and existing plot holders have a responsibility to anyone on their plot, regardless of whether they have given them permission.
- Allotments can never be fully secure. Keeping sites tidy and attractive is one of the best ways of deterring anti-social activity, theft and vandalism and promoting a healthy and safe environment for all.
- All these means are used to caution and remind members about any recent, reported or ongoing problems.
- The site has a past history of Victorian contamination. Members should be aware of this and wash produce, hands and change shoes.
- This policy is implemented through our TTACIC Constitution and Rules, Newsletters, Web site, Audits and Membership tours
- TTACIC recommends that you keep a First Aid Kit with you at the plot.
